Genre: Coming of Age Fiction

Shallow, confused, then dead. I love you, Park says. Wherefore art thou, Eleanor answers. I'm not kidding, he says. You should be. Set over the course of one school year in 1986, this is the story of two star- crossed misfits—smart enough to know that first love almost never lasts, but brave and desperate enough to try. When Eleanor meets Park, you'll remember your own first love—and just how hard it pulls you under.






Olivia Twist by Lorie Langdon




Ship Breaker by Paolo Bacigalupi
